

Stop Motion

Pre Production

After completing this project, students will be able to:

- Understand the various stages of film development (Production, pre production, and post production)
- Edit video in Adobe Premiere Pro
- Edit audio in Adobe Premiere Pro
- Understand the basics of a digital SLR camera.
- Understand how motion pictures work

PART 1: Pre-production

For your pre-production, you will be submitting the following:

These will be completed separately, saved/ downloaded as pdf's, and combined in Photoshop.

1. Synopsis PDF(complete in Google Docs/OneDrive)
2. Storyboards (complete by hand and scan)
3. List of audio sound FX to be acquired (complete in Google docs/OneDrive and download as PDF)
4. List of supplies to bring to school (clay, wire, glitter, cardboard box etc. I will provide coloured paper, glue, scissors.) Complete in Google Docs and download as PDF.

1. Synopsis

This is a very simplistic overview of your project. It should be a paragraph that describes the story arc of your stop motion, and introduces characters. It will also state how your production will be shot (is it created using 2-D, 3-D, or computer images?) This will be completed in Google Docs, and downloaded as a PDF for inclusion in your Pre-production Package/Folder/multipage PDF

2. Storyboards

These will be completed on paper, and will show any pivotal moments in your story, as well as any camera angle changes. It is a good idea to have your sound effects listed as well.

Below is a good example of a storyboard:

'How to Film' storyboard part 1

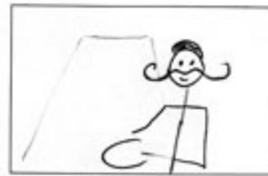


1. Wide shot of both Sarah and Callum illustrating where they are and what the film is about
Props: Megaphone, Clapper board



2. Close-up of Sarah speaking directly to camera

Script: Sarah
One thing you must remember...



3. Low angle camera pointing up at Callum

Props: Moustache, Paintbrush
Script: Callum
'Oops! Sarah is right...'



4. Close up of Sarah holding photograph



5. Camera zooms out to a wide shot showing Sarah speaking about using photographs to plan your storyboard.



6. Over shoulder shot of Callum pointing to drawings of different shots that you could try filming.

These storyboards will be scanned using Epson Scan. Your instructor will show you how!

*FOR THIS PROJECT, PLEASE SCAN AS A PDF @150ppi ,NOT A JPEG!

Make sure the image is rotated for submission.

Once scanned, move your images to the location your teacher has specified.

3. **Audio FX list**

This will be a list that you produce in Google Doc, and again, download as a PDF. Look at your storyboards, and think about what audio FX you will want to include. You must have at least 10 sound effects with hyperlinks. You can research your sounds at SoundBible.com, or better yet, Freesound.org

I would like you to create a hyperlink to the audio file that you will be using for a particular sound effect. [This video shows you how!](#)

4. **List of supplies**

This will be a list of supplies that you will need to bring to school that are specific to your stop motion. Again, this will be completed in Google Docs, and then downloaded as a PDF. This should be named "Group X Supplies List".

Multi Page PDF or Submission Folder

Once you have created the above documents, they should be stored in the same folder as pdf's. You will be submitting either the folder with the above documents, or a multi page PDF file. Your teacher will specify which, and where to submit.




Part 2- Production/filming

You are now ready to begin filming/taking shots for your production, and downloading audio. You will need sound FX from [Freesound.org](https://www.freesound.org), or [soundbible.com](https://www.soundbible.com), as well as some creative commons music from freemusicarchive.org

At this point you will also download your audio files. At the end of this stage, your folder should look something like this:



1. Please ask to borrow a camera, and possibly a tripod, from your instructor.

You will then **adjust your camera settings to look as they do below** before mounting your camera on a tripod and shooting. Here's [a video](#) to help, as well.





To adjust any of the settings, press the “Q” button to the right of the screen. This will allow you to scroll around the settings.

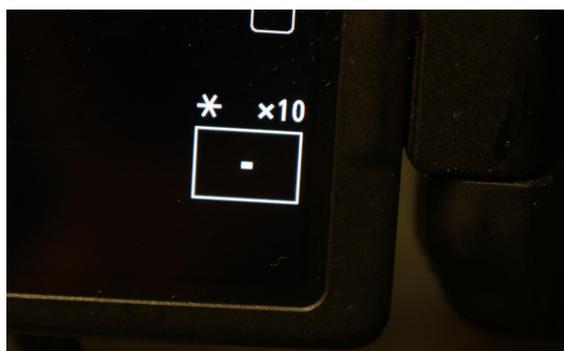
To change a setting, click the “SET” button in the center of the D-pad and adjust it.

2. Once you have your camera set up, you will need to set up a tripod to film your work. Follow along with [this video](#) to learn how!
3. ASK YOUR INSTRUCTOR TO LOOK AT YOUR TRIPOD SETUP AND FIRST PHOTOGRAPH!
4. In order to get your subject perfectly in focus, set your camera on your tripod, turn it on, and press the “Live view” button



5. Press the magnify button to zoom in on what you will be shooting. (The magnification will show on your display screen.)



6. Focus your image using the focus ring, and then press the shutter release to begin capturing images!



7. After shooting, either use Image Capture, or remove the SD card from the Camera and insert in the back of the computer to transfer images.
8. Create a folder in your Student Dropbox to store your images. I suggest creating a new folder each day you upload images.



Part 3: Post Production

At this point you will import your still images into Adobe Premiere Pro to create clips. A clip is a series of still frames played in succession at a rate that you choose.

You will be working in Adobe Premiere Pro CC. You will find the program in Applications.
